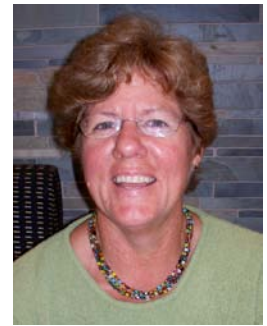


***Quadrants of Questioning: Plotting for Success***
